Dr. Dolev teaches at two schools of design in Israel and researches the connections between national identity and architecture. Her PhD dissertation analyzed the militarization of the Mt. Scopus campus of the Hebrew University, Jerusalem. Dr. Dolev is also an activist in the Israeli peace movement and a founding member of both the Women in Black movement (since 1988) and the New Profile movement (since 1998), which is dedicated to opposing militarism in Israel. Dr. Dolev's work with New Profile has been primarily through its educational team, which works to expose and reverse the deep-seated militarization of Israeli education and culture.
